

Annual Report



Reconciliation Week



Attitudes to School Survey – Completed!

In the last two weeks all students in grades four, five and six completed the attitudes to school survey. The survey provides student voice and opinion about our school. This is important information that helps us improve things and make a bigger difference to the environment, teaching and learning. We thank our students for their honesty.



Mobile Phones – Not For School Use!

Our school has a Mobile Phones Policy for students as part of the Department of Education's directive about the use of mobile phones and devices in Victorian schools. At Lalor North Primary School, this means that we do not recommend that students bring mobiles or smart devices to school – this includes watches. We do understand that there are times when a mobile phone or smart device may be required to be brought to school, e.g. if a child is walking home alone.

If a mobile phone or smart device is brought to school, it needs to be switched off and stored securely in a box at the front office.

For the purpose of this policy, "mobile phone" refers to mobile phones and any device that may connect to or have a similar functionality to a mobile phone such as smart watches, even if they are set to 'school mode'. We know that this technology has implications for young people in schools and often causes a distraction from learning.



with and to **your child**

The reading practice that your child gains from reading books they bring home from school every night is invaluable for their reading development.

Here are some strategies that you can use at home to support your child's reading.

Avoid guessing!

Encourage your child to focus on letters and sounds rather than relying on pictures. Encourage them to look closely at the word and notice letters, words within words or familiar letter patterns to help them read the word. Relying on pictures may encourage your child to 'guess' the word instead of actually reading the word on the page (Hempenstall, 2016).



Sounding out words



Encourage your child to sound out letters. For example, for the word 'dog', the child should say each sound individually: d-o-g. If they struggle to blend the sounds together, provide assistance by saying: "d-o-g. That's right, that makes the word 'dog'!" If a sound is incorrect or unknown, point to the letters and provide the correct sounds.



Discuss ideas when you are reading with your child

 Discuss the cover, the author, and the illustrator.

 Ask questions about the book. Questions such as, "What do you think will happen next?" and "Why do you think that will happen?" can build inferencing and reasoning skills.

• Discuss the storyline and the pictures. This can help develop your child's critical thinking and comprehension skills. It encourages them to think about the narrative and make connections to their own experiences.



Build vocabulary

Talk about new and unfamiliar words. This will enhance your child's understanding of new words and may support their ability to use a wider range when they are speaking or writing.

Try to create a routine for reading at home. Allocate a time and place to read each day.

Read to your child

Bedtime stories, where a book or part of a book is read each night, encourage children to engage with books and build vocabulary and language skills.

Shared book reading can "Facilitate children's language, reading, and spelling achievement throughout their development" (Mol and Bus, 2011).

Victorian Attendance Legislation

In Victoria, it is compulsory for children and young people aged 6 – 17 years to attend school.

Parents are legally required to ensure their child attends school every day and to provide an explanation for their child's absence from school unless an exemption from attendance has been granted or an exception to their attendance applies.

Evidence shows that daily school attendance is important for young people to succeed in education and to ensure they don't fall behind both socially and developmentally. Young people who regularly attend school and complete Year 12 or an equivalent qualification have better health and employment outcomes and enjoy higher incomes.

The law provides a framework for school's attendance, exemptions and exceptions from attendance and parents' obligations relating to ensuring attendance. The rules are not in place to punish students' time away from school, which can be unavoidable. Instead, the laws are an effort to promote and improve student attendance across Victorian schools.

Responsibility for Ensuring that a Child Attends School

School attendance is mandated under the *Education Training and Reform Act 2006*. It is the responsibility of parents, guardians or anyone who has parental responsibility for a child to ensure the child attends school on a regular basis.

Taking your child for an extended holiday during school term, and what you can do to ensure that their learning needs are supported...

Generally, schools advise against planning a family holiday in term time.

If you are planning an extended holiday discuss this with your school principal well in advance of finalising any plans. The principal has the discretion to decide whether or not to approve the absence taking into account the student's educational interests. If the principal approves the absence, work with your child's school so you support your child's education during their holiday.
