## The Attitudes to School Survey

The Attitudes to School Survey (AtoSS) is an annual Department of Education survey for Grade 4 to 6 students, that captures students' attitudes to and experiences at government schools.

All government schools must participate in AtoSS, providing the opportunity for students from Year 4 to Year 12 to complete the survey. The survey provides data



that helps the department understand student perspectives of their school and to improve the schooling experience.

Data from the survey is used to inform school improvement and planning to support student learning and wellbeing. The feedback is also used at the school level to make improvements.



# **New End of Day Procedure**

We would like to take a moment to remind all families about the importance of following our end of day pickup procedures. These routines are now in place to ensure the safety of all students, allow our staff to complete their end of day duties, and support the smooth running of our After School Care program.



At the end of the school day, we kindly ask that families collect their children promptly and exit the school grounds without delay. This is not a time for students to remain and play, or for extended conversations to take place on school grounds. Once your child has been collected, we encourage you to leave the premises as soon as possible.

### Here's why this is important:

Safety and Security: Our staff need to lock the gates shortly after dismissal to ensure the school grounds are secure and all students are safe and supervised.




- Clear Transition to After School Care: Remaining on site can create confusion for students enrolled in our After School Care program. A clear separation helps students understand when their day has finished or when they are transitioning to the care program.
- Staff Duties: After the school day ends, our staff are still hard at work preparing for the next day, attending meetings, and supervising After School Care. A clear and quiet school environment helps this run smoothly.



### **Breakfast Club**




# Education Week 19 - 23 May






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# Banksia 7 Education Week 2025

Despite facing challenges from colonisation and forced relocation, American Indian communities continue to preserve their heritage and contribute to American society today.




They have lived on the land for thousands of years, developing rich cultures, languages, and traditions. Each tribe has its own unique history and way of life, shaped by the environment and beliefs.





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
