FELLOWSHIPS TO TRANSFORM TEACHER PRACTICE AND STUDENT LEARNING

The Andrews Labor Government is backing teachers to pursue a range of innovative projects, delivering better educational outcomes for students by improving teaching, learning, inclusion and wellbeing in schools.

Minister for Education Natalie Hutchins today announced 30 teachers from 26 government and non-government schools have been awarded Teaching Innovation Fellowships, sharing in more than \$770,000 as part of the Teaching Excellence program from the Victorian Academy of Teaching and Leadership.

The Fellowships include funding, professional learning and mentoring for recipients to design and implement a 12-month innovation project to address an identified critical challenge in their classrooms or schools.

Fellowship recipients include:

- Joshua McQuade from St Monica's College, Epping, to develop and implement a new multi-disciplinary STEM curriculum by harnessing the knowledge of STEM expert teachers in the school.
- Shae Attrill and Kimberley Silva from Mount Rowan Secondary College to improve teaching quality and teacher confidence, while fostering cultural connection and building Koorie students' sense of selfdetermination, voice and agency.
- Birra-Li Ward and Sarah Edwards from Frankston High School to explore teacher and student collaboration across Art and Science to create real-world, problem-based learning solutions.
- Obayda Kannouj from Al-Taqwa College, to design and implement a media arts project that empowers students to engage with their communities and use filmmaking to creatively explore their cultural, language and community identity.

Fellowships will enable and support excellent teachers to be agents of change in their schools and across the education system, while the Victorian Academy of Teaching and Leadership will ensure their key learnings and experiences are shared with teachers and school leaders across the state.

The Fellowships are funded through the Victorian Academy of Teaching and Leadership in which the Labor Government has invested \$1.48.2 million over four years, enabling exceptional teachers to design professional learning solutions for teachers led by teachers.


2023 LNPS AMAZING MULTILINGUAL RACE

CHILD SAFE STANDARDS

At Lalor North Primary School, we believe that all children have the right to feel safe as well as be safe and protected. Our school has policies, procedures, and practices to keep children safe. There are 11 Child Safe Standards, and they are listed below. If you would like to know more, please visit our school website to read the policies related to child safe standards. We are also happy to receive feedback relating to the policies and practices we have in place.



- <u>Standard 1: Culturally safe environments</u> Establish a culturally safe environment in which the diverse and unique identities and experiences of Aboriginal children and young people are respected and valued.
- <u>Standard 2: Leadership, governance and culture</u> Ensure that child safety and wellbeing are embedded in school leadership, governance and culture.
- <u>Standard 3: Child and student empowerment</u> Children and young people are empowered about their rights, participate in decisions affecting them and are taken seriously.
- <u>Standard 4: Family engagement</u> Families and communities are informed and involved in promoting child safety and wellbeing.
- <u>Standard 5: Diversity and equity</u> Equity is upheld and diverse needs are respected in policy and practice.
- Standard 6: Suitable staff and volunteers People working with children and young people are suitable and supported to reflect child safety and wellbeing values in practice.
- <u>Standard 7: Child-focused complaints processes</u> Ensure that processes for complaints and concerns are child focused.
- Standard 8: Child safety knowledge, skills and awareness Staff and volunteers are
 equipped with the knowledge, skills and awareness to keep children and young people
 safe through ongoing education and training.
- <u>Standard 9: Physical and online environments</u> Physical and online environments promote safety and wellbeing while minimising the opportunity for children and young people to be harmed.
- Standard 10: Review of child safety practices Implementation of the Child Safe Standards is regularly reviewed and improved.
- <u>Standard 11: Implementation of child safety practices</u> Policies and procedures that document how schools are safe for children, young people and students.

Every Day Counts

Primary School Attendance

Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education. Students learn new things at school every day — missing school puts them behind.

School is better when your child is there

Why it's important

We all want our students to get a great education, and the building blocks for a great education begin with students coming to school each and every day.

If students miss school regularly, they miss out on learning the fundamental skills that will set them up for success in the later years of school.

There is no safe number of days for missing school – each day a student misses puts them behind, and can affect their educational outcomes.

Each missed day is associated with progressively lower achievement in numeracy, writing and reading.

Getting in early

Attendance patterns are established early – a child regularly missing days in kindergarten or in the early years of school will often continue to miss classes in the later years, and receive lower test scores than their classmates.

It's vital that students go to school every day – even in the early years of primary school.

In Victoria school is compulsory for children and young people aged 6 - 17 years

Student Absences

The main reasons for absence are:

Sickness – There are always times when students need to miss school, such as when they're ill. It's vital that they're only away on the days they are genuinely sick, and developing good sleep patterns, eating well and exercising regularly can make a big difference.

Family holidays - It's vital that holidays are planned during school holidays where possible, and not during the term. If you are planning to go on holiday during term time, make sure that you talk to your child's school in advance, and work with them to develop an absence learning plan.

"Day off" – Think twice before letting your child have a "day off" as they could fall behind their classmates – every day counts.

Truancy – This is when students choose not to go to school without their parent's permission. There can be many reasons for truancy. The best way to address this is for schools and parents to work together.

School refusal - School refusing children will experience significant emotional distress not only when going to school but also at the thought of going to school; they may be absent from school for weeks or even months at a time. School refusal differs from truancy as children generally stay home with the knowledge of the parents and despite their best efforts to encourage their child to go to school. See: My child or teenager has anxiety

Being away from school for one day a fortnight equal missing 1.5 years over 13 years of school

If your child is away

If for any reason your child must miss school, there are things you can do with your school to ensure they don't fall behind:

Inform the school

- Speak with your child's classroom teacher and find out what work they need to do to keep up.
- Develop an absence learning plan with your teacher and ensure your child completes the plan.

Remember, every day counts. If your child must miss school, speak with your classroom teacher as early as possible.

Openly communicating with your child's school about all absences is a good way to prevent attendance issues being escalated to a School Attendance Officer. A School Attendance Officer is a Department of Education and Training Regional Director who has authority to follow up attendance issues. Chronic or ongoing attendance issues that are escalated can lead to an Infringement Notice being issued to parent/s.

If you're having attendance issues with your child, please let your classroom teacher know so we can work together to get your child to school every day.

Top attendance tips for parents

- Schools want to work in partnership with parents act early if you have any concerns by contacting your child's school and asking for advice and support
- · Remember that every day counts
- There is no safe number of days for missing school each day a student misses puts them behind, and can affect their educational outcomes and their social connectedness
- Talk positively about school and the importance of attending every day
- Open and prompt communication with your child's school about all absences is a good idea
- Avoid making routine medical and dental appointments during the school day or planning family holidays during the term
- Seek help from your school if you are concerned about your child's attendance and wellbeing. Schools want to work in partnership with parents to support student attendance and wellbeing.

Stay well this Winter

Symptoms of influenza (flu) can hit very quickly and may last several weeks. Vaccination is the best way to protect yourself and others from getting the flu.

<u>Annual influenza vaccination</u> is recommended from mid-April each year and is free under the <u>National Immunisation Program</u> for those at higher risk of complications from the flu.

Keeping our school community well

Parents, carers and students are encouraged to practice prevention measures, including:

- washing and sanitising hands regularly
- avoiding touching eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands
- covering nose and mouth when coughing or sneezing
- staying home if unwell and consulting a general practitioner (GP) or Nurse-on-call as required
- staying up to date with flu and COVID-19 vaccinations.

Flu vaccinations

Flu vaccinations can be booked through GPs and pharmacies, many of which can also provide COVID19 vaccinations. Flu vaccination is recommended for everyone aged 6 months and over.

Some people are more at risk of complications from flu and are eligible for free vaccination as part of the National Immunisation Program.

COVID-19 booster

The 2023 COVID-19 booster dose is available for everyone aged 18 and above.

Getting your booster dose remains the best way to prevent severe illness or hospitalisation, especially in people aged over 65 and those at higher risk of severe illness. You can have your booster dose 6 months after your last dose or COVID infection.

Children aged between 5 and 17 years who are at risk of severe illness can also receive a 2023 booster dose.

You can get your next dose at your local pharmacy or GP. To find one near you, refer to the vaccine clinic finder.

Supporting Children with Challenging Behaviours (3-week program)

Presented by: Angie Zerella – The Mindful Sanctuary

Quality Area 5: Relationships with children

Behaviour is the action of emotion and so unless we understand the emotion, we cannot understand the behaviour and develop appropriate strategies to support young children. This training is delivered in three sessions and is an interactive delivery model in a workshop style presentation. Dealing with the real-life scenarios and experiences facing participants, the sessions aim to work through targeted and specific solutions to real world participant challenges. The sessions will motivate and bring hope, joy and satisfaction to educators work with complex situations.



Session 1

This session aims to focus on understanding the purpose of behaviour, and the underpinning emotion that is resulting in the actions and reactions of the child/children. It grounds educators in the view of the child's world, re-thinking behaviour through the lens of the child.

Educators will share their insights into the challenges they are facing in their work and critical reflection will occur, specifically focusing on how the particular behaviours may impact and be impacted by the learning environment. Strategies will be discussed to put into action for the following week.

Session 2

Educators will bring insights into this session as to the outcome of the strategies from the prior week.

More in-depth discussion will occur with the session tailored to the challenges at hand. It will be an open discussion with Ideas and suggestions shared in a workshop style format. More strategies will be developed for the following week.

Session 3

Educators will bring insights into this session as to the outcome of the strategies from the prior week.

The session will give deeper Insight and specific strategies to support the child/children, other educators, and families. The importance of a consistent and collaborative approach will be centred in the discussion with understanding the situation through the child's lens being the key factor in effective ongoing solution-based strategies.
